I thought leaving my hometown would help stop the pain I carried in my heart for two years along with my addiction. There was a sense of excitement and fear as I closed the lid of my suitcase and slowly looked around the room. As my eyes met my reflection in the dresser mirror I said, "You're headed on a new adventure to meet new friends, find a new job, and have a new life."

I took one last look around the house that I had called home for the past ten years. In spite of the nerves, the fear of staying outweighed the fear of leaving. I grasped the surge of excitement and said good-bye to the cold and frigid city of Pittsburgh and headed south.

Things were just as I expected: great family connections and a new job working with teenagers as I had done up north. The transition from North to South seemed to be going smoothly and I was so happy. As I continued to unpack, I opened the lid of my suitcase and let out the things I thought I could handle in my new found happiness: myself, old pain, disillusionment, and addiction. However, in no time my new adventure had turned to a world of shattered dreams.

Thankfully I had met a co-worker named Pam who became my friend. She recognized the pain and problems that were inside of me. Pam suggested that I seek help. She found The Women's Shelter online and helped me schedule an interview to meet the staff. This interview was going to be my lifeline from destruction. I was overwhelmed when I walked up to the address on the paper. It was an amazing house with a screened-in porch that felt like a welcoming hug of encouragement. I sat down with Ms. Angie and took a chance at brutal honesty. I was received with love, compassion, and acceptance.

Every day wasn't a great day living in the main house of The Women's Shelter. Ms. Angie and Ms. Joanne broke me down mentally and helped me peel off all the masks I was wearing. They helped me become the beautiful, humble, grateful woman that I am today. I am learning to deal with my past and to live with life on life's terms again. It would not have been possible with-

out the experiences of living with other women overcoming similar issues, dealing with new rules and regulations, and the assistance of exceptional staff. Ms. Kathy Riley, "my angel from God," is the Executive Director of The Women's Shelter. She has shown me that trust can be restored and has given me hope in the possibilities the future holds. I struggled with finding a job and Ms. Kathy referred me to a job in retail. I had no experience in retail, but as always "my angel" saw something in me that I didn't see in myself. She knew the job would be perfect for me.

April 23, 2014, marks my one year anniversary in The Women's Shelter program. I'm grateful for the opportunity Ms. Kathy gave me in August 2013 to enter into the second phase of the program, transitional housing. Ms. Cynthia works with me in this phase and has provided the resources for me to get the help I need to change the direction of my life.

When I moved to the South I knew that I would be embarking on a new adventure, getting a new job, and gaining new friends. However, I never expected that this new adventure would include recovery or living in a rental house. The day I moved into my transitional house, I unpacked my suitcase. There was nothing left behind. It was empty for I had finally dealt with the secrets and shame. I looked around this new home, at my reflection in the mirror and smiled.

If you would like to meet this beautiful, grateful miracle that The Women's Shelter helped me become, come see me. I work at Revente's Second Chances, a charity resale shop that benefits The Women's Shelter. Debbie McDaniel is the owner. She is a successful business woman with a big heart that believes in giving back. Mrs. Patti Rosenfeld is my manager. She teaches me something new every day about life. I'm so grateful for these two women and everything they do for me.

I thank God for The Women's Shelter, Ms. Kathy and her helpers for giving me my life back. I will always be grateful and love you all.
