My Year At The Women's Shelter: Part II

n July 20, 2012, she arrived for her 10:30 AM interview with the House Director of The Women's Shelter and was thrilled and so thank-full to be accepted. She was presented with a small pile of papers regarding the rules and regulations clarifying the structure of The Women's Shelter program and her responsibilities as a participant. All appeared reasonable and reassuring; she was in the right place. She signed where needed, thus initiating her personal life. Then the House Director instructed her to collect her personal belongings, money from her bank account for minimal rent, and be back by 2:00 PM to claim her bed in the main house.

Upon her return she was offered every personal amenity she needed, provided a nice set of sheets, and was shown upstairs to her room which she would share with one other resident. After making her bed and stowing away her belongings she settled on the porch. Within a short while, she was joined by the other residents. Around 4:30 PM there was a "changing of the guard" as the House Director was replaced by the staff member who would be staying with them over the weekend.

In the following weeks she would watch a parade of women enter and sometimes leave the main house. The Women's Shelter program was indeed so structured one had to truly <u>need</u> to succeed to be able to stay. She met and interacted with all the wonder-full regular staff members as well as the women who volunteered their time and energy to create menus and roster for household chores and teach about the Bible, yoga, nutrition, exercise, computer skills, journaling, resume and interview skills, recovery, and even line dancing.

What a marvelous program! It took five weeks, but she finally secured a work position with a well known arts and crafts company store at the end of August. While she was so grateful just to have a job the realities were that it was only part-time and involved walking one half mile from the nearest bus stop in triple digit temperatures. The job required standing on her feet three to four hours and then walking the one half mile back to the bus stop for just slightly more than minimum wage. It was taxing and ultimately did not satisfy the requirements to be able to progress in the program so she had to continue to seek other employment during her days off.

In mid October she obtained a new work position as an seamstress for a major dry cleaning chain in Columbia. She received full time hours at a pay increase. Furthermore, she was sewing which she truly enjoyed. The fact that she only needed to walk a short distance to and from the bus stop to attend this position was a definite plus.

Having now fully satisfied the requirement of the first phase of the program, she was offered the opportunity to enter the second phase and "transition" out of the main house into one of the houses owned by The Women's Shelter within the local neighborhood. She could not stop crying as she and another resident were shown around the beautiful fully furnished house they would share.

Early November excitement escalated among the residents in anticipation of attending their first

formal outing. Fully aware they would be representing The Women's Shelter, they took great care assisting each other and finessing their appearances. The event was the 33^{rd} Annual Thanksgiving Souper: the major fundraiser for The Women's Shelter. It was so named becauseas opposed to the opulence associated with Thanksgiving dinner-this meal consisted simply of a bowl of soup, a package of crackers, and a cup of tea; to keep in mind those less fortunate. She didn't know the countless many who had contributed to this event. She could only be grateful that there are those who cared enough to create it. She knew that the majority of people contributing their time and energy serving this meal were connected with the sponsor of the Souper, Chick-fil-A; the same organization that so generously provides the regular Monday evening meal at The Women's Shelter each week. For this event they also supplied their miniature signature stuffed cows, calendars with coupons, and their larger-than-life cow for wonder-fully fun photo ops!

The evening included a fine presentation including a streaming video about the history and current status of The Women's Shelter. There were well produced items offered in raffles; one being a brightly colored quilt for which she bought a ticket. Throughout the evening there had been beautiful music in the background provided by a gentleman playing a piano as people moved from table to table and milled around in conversation. When it came time to leave they all agreed it had been an awesome affair all around!
