Emphasis on Exit Strategies

For almost 40 years The Women's Shelter has been very successful in helping homeless women who come into our emergency shelter to stabilize emotionally and mentally. We have also been successful in our transitional housing program with reintegrating our residents into the workforce and society while working on long-term goals. From the beginning we have set very minimal program fees for our program participants. Residents understand that maintaining employment, establishing savings, and debt reduction are expectations of our program. Our experience indicates that the women who entered our program with a limited work history generally exit the program working in stable entry level jobs. Therefore, for the past two years we have put into place our Emphasis on Exit Strategies program in order to put more effort into assisting our residents with overcoming obstacles that keep them from accessing higher education, skilled jobs, and affordable housing. The program participants who recognize the benefits of our highly structured and supportive program stay for an average of nine months and some for up to two years. As a result they are overcoming many obstacles.

Our Emphases on Exit Strategies program is funded largely by grants from the Sisters of Charity Foundation and the NORD Foundation as well as support from our faithful donors. This program includes classes and one-on-one sessions on such topics as employment strategies; interviewing skills; leadership/management skills; budgeting; debt reduction; goal setting; and communication skills. It also includes case management for our residents and assistance in establishing and taking action steps necessary to overcome obstacles to meet their goals. The third program component is paid internships. These internships are helping our program participants to reduce their debt as well as begin to dream beyond stable entry level jobs. They

are experiencing and considering career options with higher earning potential. Over a third of our residents have participated in an internship over the past two years.

One of our residents completed a 150 hour internship at Turnipseed & Associates. She had previously worked at a law firm and had begun paralegal classes before beginning a downward spiral. The internship at Turnipseed & Associates was a wonderful opportunity for her to update her resume with current experience at a law firm. She listed Turnipseed & Associates as a reference on a recent job application and received a very favorable recommendation which resulted in being hired at the new job earning more per hour and having more opportunities for advancement. The internship monies allowed her to pay off outstanding debts.

Due to the opportunity to do an internship in the banquets area of the Marriott, another resident was encouraged by the supervisor over banquets to apply for a part-time position with the hope of a full-time position becoming available. She did apply and is now working part -time at the Marriott in addition to her full-time job in food service at a local university. A full-time position at the Marriott would be a wage increase over the wages with her current employer so she hopes to eventually obtain a fulltime job there. The money earned from the internship has enabled her to make payments on outstanding debts, and her credit score has improved since coming into our program. She is making payments to get out of default on students loans so she can go back to school to pursue culinary arts. Her great attitude and strong work ethic displayed during the internship opened doors for her at the Marriott.
